


Managing Wildfires in El Dorado County



El Dorado County Diverse Responsibility Land Ownership





Responsible areas within the County:

- State Responsibility Area – SRA
 - Lands where the State government has the primary financial responsibility for preventing and suppressing wildland fires.
- Federal Responsibility Area – FRA
 - Lands where the Federal government has the primary financial responsibility for preventing and suppressing wildland fires.
- Local Responsibility Area – LRA
 - Lands where local government agencies, such as city or county fire departments, are primarily responsible for wildfire protection and emergency response.


Direct Protection Areas:

- Direct Protection Areas, DPA, delineates the dividing lines between land that will be provided wildland fire protection by State, Federal and Local agencies.







Agreements

- CFAA: The CFAA is the negotiated reimbursement mechanism for local government fire agency responses through the California Fire Service and Rescue Emergency Mutual Aid System.
-
- CFMA: The California Master Cooperative Wildland Fire Management and Stafford Act Response Agreement (CFMA) is a framework for cooperation between various agencies in California for wildland fire management and responses to presidential declared emergencies or disasters. It facilitates the coordination and exchange of resources, personnel, and information to improve efficiency in fire prevention, preparedness, and response.
 - MMA: The California Master Mutual Aid Agreement (MMAA) is a formal agreement that enables the State of California, its various departments and agencies, and its political subdivisions to provide mutual aid during emergencies. It establishes a framework for jurisdictions to share resources and personnel while maintaining control of their own assets, facilitating a coordinated response to disasters.
