- 6. New Business
 - a. Presentation Greater Placerville Evacuation Study Dan Bolster, Transportation Commission

Woody Delory, Executive Director, was present as well. Dan Bolster's presentation explained that the evacuation study doesn't tell you where to go, it explains critical transportation infrastructure projects necessary to evacuate homeowners and for first responders to get in to fight fires. This study will be used to apply for federal and state grants to

This study will be used to apply for federal and state grants to make the improvements mentioned in this study.

b. Bookkeeping Services Proposal Board Action Item

Ken/Janet - We interviewed two vendors. Christina Cavanaugh charges \$58-78/hr for bookkeeping services. Linda Parks charges \$35/hr and she works with nonprofits around the county. She was very interested in working for EDCFSC. Ken recommends hiring Linda Parks for posting to QuickBooks (previously performed by Pat Turner), bookkeeping and check preparation. Pat Turner will continue to prepare annual taxes. Requires budget increase of \$5,500. Janet reported that almost \$600,00 will be available in administrative charges from grants through 2026 to use for operations. Current annual operating costs are approximately \$120,000.

David Zelinsky makes motion to hire bookkeeper 2nd from Karen. Approved to hire bookkeeper Linda Parks.

c. Letter of Support – El Dorado County D-Space Ordinance Board Action Item

Ken presented the Board with a request for letter of support for El Dorado County D-Space Ordinance update. Ken is abstaining from voting due to potential conflict of interest working with the county. Hugh has been representing EDCFSC in working with the county on the defensible space ordinance. He indicated this letter supports updates to the ordinance that has been in place since 1985. County chiefs also wrote a letter of support.

Discussion and comments were heard from associate councils regarding support for this letter. Word correction of "tenant" was made. David made a motion to approve the letter. Letter was approved with the following votes: 16 Aye 3 Abstain 1 Present with comments

7. Old Business

a. Community Wildfire Protection Plan – Tom Meyer (OWPR)

Worked with consultant to finalize scope of work on CWPP. It should be finalized in March to take it to the Board of Supervisors. We are working to identify a list of stakeholders in the CWPP working group to get things moving on the project.

b. Vice Chair Report - Hugh Council

This Tuesday there is a full class (30) for Field Maps with people who have taken defensible space training. CAL FIRE will be present as well. There could be more of these classes in the future. April 19 & 20 there will be a two-day defensible space training class with a sign-up sheet on the back table. The state of California is looking at adopting an urban wildland interface code. There will be a meeting today to discuss that.

2. CAL FIRE - Megan Scheeline/Jeff Hoag

Chief Hoag reported they are coordinating defensible space inspections in the county, and they will be sending letters letting people know when they will be in the area for inspections. We are hiring more personnel for technical assistance. The fire hazard severity zone map was approved by the Office of Administrative Law and will be in effect on April 1st.

Patrick McDaniel –Received 16 wildfire prevention and four health grant applications from Region Office to review.

3. EDC Office of Wildfire Preparedness and Resilience – Tom Meyer

Weber Creek CWPP – Reviewing four proposals to complete environmental review. Anticipate awarding contract in next two weeks.

The current year's defensible space CEA's are wrapping things up. Texas Hill inspections are in process and Outingdale will be April through May. We are hosting an informational workshop in Outingdale on March 5th at Pioneer Park community center from 6p-8p. OWPR defensible space working group identifying CEAs for the coming year. There will be coordinated messaging going out to people in those areas.

Coloma/Lotus is still waiting for Firewise approval.

There was a defensible space ordinance update workshop in Tahoe on February 13th and the next workshop is Thursday, February 29, 2024, at the Cameron Park CSD from 6pm-8pm. There is a dedicated page for the defensible space ordinance update on the OWPR website.

OWPR received notice from BLM in January that they will receive an initial

\$100,000 as part of a total \$10 million grant for defensible space and hazardous fuels reduction. Remaining funds will be contingent upon approval of the federal budget.

Firesafe coordinator grant application period opens tomorrow and closes mid-March. OWPR applying with intent of refilling position.

OWPR is working with County GIS to clean up FSC boundary maps.

4. EDC Fire Chiefs Association - Tim Cordero

Most of the fire districts perform defensible space inspections and will partner with CAL FIRE and OWPR to complete them. Several fire district members are involved with the defensible space ordinance update.

March 23rd we will be at the Placerville FSC event and there will be a sand table demo for the public.

Worked with CAL OES during recent storms to have seven additional engine companies staffed for response and clean up.

8. SMUD – Eric Brown

In January and February, we participated in El Dorado Ag in Classroom with arborists and fifth graders from Gold Trail School. American River watershed Fuels road work engaged 1500 parcels. Currently seeking approval from just a few remaining landowners.

9. PG&E - Mike Webb

No report – Ken indicated that he and Tom Meyer met with the PG&E Vegetation Management Program and Mike Webb. Mike is working to get PG&E included in collaboration with EDCFSC.

Sheriff OES now has the Perimeter software to assist with evacuation information including real time updates on evacuation orders, road closures, resource locations and other critical details. Lt Morton gave a presentation on the Perimeter website. RAVE is still the emergency alert and warning system. There will still be door to door contact by deputies during evacuations.

11. BOR – Elizabeth Dyer

Expressed gratitude to for today's meeting to help BOR understand who all the partners are. We are working with Mike Connelly on Auburn Lake Trails shaded fuel break. Wildfire services and CCC are on the job as well. We will be doing mastication, and we are working with AEU to get a permit for the burning that will be done. Thanked Patrick McDonald for all his assistance and knowledge. We are also working with Steve Willis and the CCC in Lake Hills on their shaded fuel break to clear the boundary.

9. Program Reports

a. Grants & Funding/Grants Committee
 – Tamara Johnston
 January was a big reporting month for quarterly reports as well as submitting CAL FIRE
 grant applications.

A grant proposal was submitted to the Women's fund for \$8k for defensible space. We had a pending grant of \$75k for defensible space assistance that was declined. CA FSC grant is due March 15th for \$100,000. Partnering with associate fscs to do small projects for education and outreach for \$2-\$4k. If anyone is interested in this grant reach out to me. If you are thinking about a project talk with me first. Start early to meet with me for assistance.

- b. Assistance Programs Jessica Isabel
 - Chipping
 YTD 47 jobs completed, cleared 102 acres, chipped 7,751 cubic yards and \$22,817 was spent.
 - Defensible Space Services for Seniors, etc.
 YTD Cleared 6 parcels and spent \$7,751.10 which served 2 veterans, 6 seniors, 3 were disabled, and 2 were low income.
 - Hazard Tree Removal YTD Assessed 16 new parcels, completed 54 jobs, identified 51 new trees, cut 107 and spent \$124,345.

County Biomass Working Group - Kris Payne

Greg Stanton, reported to me that the Black Oak Mine School District and Wisewood Energy are exploring PG&E's Micro-Grid Incentive Program (MIP) which provides up to \$18M in funding per project. The county is applying for a USDA rural business development grant next week to fund bio energy development.

David Zelinsky also mentioned he and Kris Payne will be attending a meeting at RCD tomorrow at 2pm with Team Rubicon, a volunteer veteran, disaster recovery team. Also, the Amador El Dorado Forest Forum has an in-person presentation from American Forests on California reforestation on Wednesday evening at 6pm.

11. Community Council Reports

Jeanine Stiles - Greenstone FSC- We have had interest in defensible space assessments since Farmers Insurance is cancelling a lot of policies. Greenstone had 4 more homes assessed. We are planning events for May and sent a newsletter out regarding 4291 and as a result we are getting people interested in the defensible space ordinance.

Kris Payne – Patterson Ranch FSC - Attended a meeting at RCD. Team Rubicon is going to have a project in the Sacramento area for 6 weeks and will have 50 volunteers from Massachusetts Maritime Academy there. It is scheduled for April 21st-May 18th.

Alice Cantelow - Oak Hill FSC – We had 2 winter workshops. Dan Bolster will present the greater Placerville Wildfire Evacuation study. Diamond Springs and Fort Jim will be there tonight. We also had a banner stolen.

Dorothy Fine - Camino FSC – I would like to thank the RCD for putting in an application for Fire Adapted 50 Phase 3. Forest Health Project ties in with OES and the Transportation Commission. We are hoping to get 11 miles cleared. We also received several letters of support from associate fscs and the EDCFSC. Thank you for all the assistance programs.

- Conduct research of successful and unsuccessful FSCs and similar organizations in similar circumstances
- Discuss EDCFSC current and future mission, organization, and scope

- Present recommendations to E-Board
- Revise as appropriate
- Present to overall Board of Directors
- Revise as appropriate
- Submit to Board of Directors for approval
- Implement final determination

History:

- Organized 2001
- 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization
- Several historic (e.g., King, Cleveland) and recent (e.g., Caldor, Mosquito) fires have impacted the county, heightened awareness of fire hazards and prevention, and resulted in significant funding for prevention channeled locally

 Climate, forest management practices, and development in the Wildland Urban Interface have affected the frequency, magnitude, and impact of wildland fires

Current Status:

- 30+ Associate Fire Safe Councils covering significant portions (but not all) of the El Dorado County western slope
- E-Board consisting of Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer, Secretary, Parliamentarian
- Managing ~\$12 million for chipping, defensible space, hazardous tree programs through grants from various sources
- Volunteer only except as noted (part time clerk, grants assistance, grants manager; contracted services e.g., bookkeeping, IT support)
- Numerous training and educational programs (e.g., defensible space/home hardening assessor) and publications
- Partner organizations at the county, state, and federal level are increasingly active in wildland fire prevention

The EDFSC:

- Has taken on the mission, along with partner organizations, of protecting the people, communities, structures, and environment of El Dorado County from wildland fire.
- Is the community-based component of a comprehensive approach to forest and wildland fire management
- Is in the enviable position of being "victims of our own success."
- Has recognized that relying primarily on volunteer efforts to effectively manage current and future programs is not sustainable.
